They will learn the principles of harmony in building major and minor chords and playing famous chord sequences - I, V, vi, IV and 12 bar blues. Chords will also be revised on ukulele. Students will then learn about the history of popular music and analyse the change and development of musical features through time from 1920-2020. They will learn to play iconic pieces of music from different decades - 1960's, 1980's, 2000's	Harmony, chords and tonality are the basis of all music and will be vital for the learning that comes later. Students will begin to play the keyboard with both hands which will be important for later projects. They will analyse scenes from films and be able to understand the importance of music in film. They will learn ti play iconic themes by John Williams and Hans Zimmer before composing their own leitmotifs. Students will analyse the impact of technology on music and will begin to use technology in making music. They will look at how music is created, toured and shred and will use a variety of production websites and DAW's to create music - GarageBand, Logic, BandLab, IncrediBox, Ableton	Students will be able to apply their knowledge of musical features to analysis - MADTSHIRTS. Understanding the expressions and interpretation behind film music will allow them to apply this to other areas of music. Music technology is vital in modern music and utilising technology will allow students greater access to composition. They will use this analysis to inform their own performance and will put on a 'good' performance paying attention to communication with the audience and staging.
